Lay Minister Richard writes: Why won't Christmas hurry up and COME??!!

This was a cry that used to echo around our house when I was a little boy, and I suspect in many homes today. Why do we have to wait so long?

Waiting is all about anticipation - too often today alas, it's more for consumerism than for the child after whom the festival is named. Sadly, the run-up to Christmas starts in about September with 'seasonal' music being played over and over again in stores - I even heard Jingle Bells in July this year in one shop. But Jingle bells playing for months on end in our shops is not about Christmas - it's the tune the tills play in response to unending advertisements to stimulate our appetite to buy, buy, buy.

Even so, three or four months of waiting is a comparatively short time and nothing like the challenge story of the first Christmas¹: Just think what the waiting was like for a young teenager called Mary – who was over eight months pregnant at the beginning of December; try to imagine what those long months had been like for that girl - having been told back in March that you have 'found favour with God' and you're going to have a son called the Son of the Most High and he'll be given the throne of King David, revered down the centuries in Jewish and subsequently Christian history.

And then in the last month of her pregnancy that amazingly humble girl, supported by her fiancé, had to travel 90 miles, perhaps walking or at best riding on a donkey, over rough roads, and all because they had to register for tax purposes on the insistence of the Roman Emperor. The roads would have crowded with other travellers doing the same thing, and there was a high chance of being robbed or attacked. Can you imagine just what that waiting must have been like for Mary?

And when they do arrive at the end of the journey, the novacancies signs are all over town and the only place available for them is a smelly old stable, the only bed for the newborn baby is in a food trough for cows. Not much of a start in life, I think you'll agree, for the King of Kings, and Prince of Peace. But that is the really important point for us - the Son of God wasn't born in a Palace with all the trappings of wealth, but into a poor family in desperate straits. And we should receive, absorb the message of that amazing story just as the shepherds out in the field did – and they rushed to see that child - our Saviour. We can but offer a prayer of thanks and humble praise.

So, what to do, today, while we're waiting, how can we prepare ourselves properly for Christmas, because it's about so much more than just opening a door every day on the Advent calendar and shop, shop, shop?

Well, firstly, the nativity play and singing carols and hearing the great story told are good ways to start. But how about helping those who can't help themselves to celebrate Christ's birth – in what ways can we be helpful and kind and considerate, at home, at school and in our village or town? Think of the poor, the lonely and those who are sad or sick, at home and abroad, and how we might be able to help them. We should contribute to helping refugees from violence, and all victims of war. Because we know that Jesus would.

So meantime, while we're waiting, let's all 'be prepared' in love and humility for Jesus Christ coming amongst us, to really celebrate the real meaning of Christmas, and put Jesus first – put the Christ into our Christmas. And during those celebrations, you will be very welcome to join us in our villages' churches - there are lists of Services in this magazine.

And as we await the New Year, in these troubled times – remember the words of the poem:

I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year "Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown".

And he replied:

"Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the Hand of God.

That shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way".

So I went forth, and finding the Hand of God, trod gladly into the night.

From all our churches, we wish you and your loved ones a very happy Christmas and a more peaceful New Year – for the whole of our world - God's world.



Due to retirements, moving away and other activities on Sunday the choir needs more adult singers in all voice parts. The Junior Choir also is short of voices.


Choir practices are on Fridays: Juniors 5.30 - 6.30, (safe guarding rules are followed) Adults 6.30 -7.15.

The House of Bishops worships at Holy Trinity

The Diocesan Bishops of the Church of England, led by the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby (right), and Archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell (left), along with other representative bishops, met for three days at a location in Cookham in November to discuss matters ahead of the General Synod meeting later in the month.



Each morning and evening they worshipped at Holy Trinity with help from the worship teams from our two parishes. The Archbishops presided on consecutive evenings at a Eucharist service and many of the

bishops commented how good it had been to worship together in a "real" church rather than a makeshift one in a conference room.

Archbishop Stephen is also an expert on Stanley Spencer and arranged for the bishops to visit the Gallery for a special viewing of the exhibition.

Trinity Talks - 15 January

Introducing Medieval and Historical Graffiti

Graffiti would have been made by local people of the past, reflecting their concerns and hopes in the form of memorials, devotional and protection marks, and other symbols. James Peddle's talk is about the medieval and historical graffiti found in Berkshire, including at Holy Trinity Church, Cookham.

James has a long-standing interest in church buildings, and is a volunteer archaeologist, currently assisting with the excavations at Cookham Abbey. He set up, and now coordinates, the Berkshire Medieval Graffiti Survey group (part of Berkshire Archaeology Society), which aims to record a building's graffiti and engage with the local community.

The Talks are held at Bel and The Dragon in Cookham High Street on the third Monday of the month and celebrate the talents of people living in Cookham and its environs. These are fund-raising events for Holy Trinity Church.

Following in the footsteps of St Paul: Cookham's Pilgrimage 2024

A no obligation opportunity to find out more about next year's pilgrimage.

Are you inspired to find our more about this exciting pilgrimage that gives an insight into the passion of Paul's ministry and to bring alive his experiences by visiting those places where they occurred as is chronicled in the Acts of the Apostles.

Join us for a short presentation to hear about how our 2024 Pilgrimage to Greece brings the bible alive. St Paul was one of the first missionaries and during his Second Journey, after travelling through Syria, Galatia and Asia he arrived at Troas on the Aegean coast. While at Troas, Paul had a vision telling him to go to Macedonia (Europe) which he did and he landed at Neopolis in 51 AD. Today Neopolis is called Kavala and is where our pilgrimage begins.

From there we continue to follow St Paul's journey through Greece ending in Corinth; referencing along the way, the different historic places to the events that occurred, as St Luke details in his account of Paul's journey. It is believed that Paul was a very close friend of St Luke who documented St Pauls travels in the Acts of the Apostles.

Join us in the Jubilee Vestry at St John the Baptist Church, Cookham Dean at 7pm on Wednesday 6th December. The presentation will last about 30 minutes and will be followed with tea/coffee.



Methodist Minister Vicci Davidson writes:

I expect you, like me, are frustrated by the terrible state of our roads. Potholes the size of small ponds appear out of nowhere and threaten our tyres, axles and suspension and make for a bumpy ride, unless we engage our inner-racing driver and slalom down the road which is generally frowned upon by police and other drivers.

David Hope, the author rather than the erstwhile Archbishop of York, wrote:

"We cheer the express as it thunders along The driver and crew – I would add to the song A word for the gangers who, sunshine or snow, Have been out to check every yard that we go."

It's rather old-fashioned and sentimental now, and when I tried to date it, even Google couldn't find it, but it reminded me how spoiled I have become in my complaints about the roads. Train tracks must remain true and even or there are terrible accidents, and there are people who take that job and do it, usually at night when there is time for them to measure and balance safely.

That checking of each yard of metal and wood that keeps everything safe is something that we also try to do each day for our own souls through our Bible reading and prayer, aligning ourselves with God so that we can hear what he wants from us. It's why Paul, in his letter to the Thessalonians tells us: "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God for you." (1 Thessalonians 5:16-17).

Over the last two decades or so, people of all faiths and none have discovered that the Christian habit of giving thanks for all sorts of things is actually very good for the soul. Mindfulness books, self-help writers and counsellors dealing with depression and anxiety may all advocate keeping a journal of blessings. I sometimes say to the AV team at Windsor that we only notice them at all when it has gone wrong, because they are always so quietly and brilliantly efficient. Perhaps the wonky roads, and the other little annoyances that meet us in our daily lives help to remind us that there are people who fulfil these jobs for us. Perhaps we should be less angry about the potholes and more grateful for those who will (eventually!) get round to filling them.

Cookham visits Saint-Benoit

Over the October half-term, 21st-24th October, 18 members of Cookham Twinning visited Cookham's twinned village of Saint-Benoit, near Poitiers in France. Cookham has been twinned with Saint-Benoit since 1994, but this was the first visit since 2019 because of Covid restrictions.

Visitors stayed with local French families, and, as ever, the hospitality was excellent. A varied programme of social and cultural events had been organised, and we were kept both busy and very well fed.

The first event, on the Saturday evening, was a reception in the Mairie, (Town Hall), hosted by the Mayor of Saint-Benoit. The Cookham visitors presented Saint-Benoit with two copies of 'The Wind in the Willows', one in English and one in French, and we explained that this book was inspired by the Thames at Cookham.

The following day there was the opportunity to walk around Saint-Benoit, including a visit to the 'Jardin de Cookham'. Saint-Benoit is a four-star, 'Ville Fleurie', (garden village), and takes a lot of interest in its parks, gardens and environment. The visitors and hosts met for lunch together, followed by a cello recital in the local abbey church.

On Monday the group visited the medieval town of Chauvigny, with its five ruined castles, and beautifully decorated church. The hosts had laid on good English rain for the visit! After lunch in the town, the group went on to the Macaroon Museum in Montmorillon, including tasting samples and afterwards a tour of the town,

The final evening was spent together with more good food, (and wine), with songs from a local guitarist and occasional vocal accompaniment from the Mayor. On Tuesday, the group said their farewells, and everyone now looks forward to the visit of Saint-Benoit to Cookham next October.


Closure of Cookham Bridge

We see it as a chance to take a good look at the work that needs to be done over the next decade to prevent the further (and currently accelerating) decline in our natural world. The UK is one of the most environmentally depleted countries in the world and the pressures locally from seemingly non-stop development underscore the need for more local people who can step up and help us.

One event to mark in your diary for 2024 is our **Big Wildlife Weekend (22/23 June)** when we will be asking everyone in Cookham to look at what you have in your garden and take steps to increase its value as a home for wildlife. We also have a big push behind more ponds in our gardens. Now is the time to be planning and starting work on that – and contact us at wildcookham@gmail.com for advice on this. You can also get some practice in with the RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch on 26-28 January.

If it's still December and you're stuck for a Christmas gift, how about a nest box or a bug house or give membership of one of the excellent wildlife groups such as the RSPB or our local wildlife trust? And remember that a gift of your time to local wildlife in 2024 will be an inestimable gift to future generations.

Winter Bees

The weather has finally started to cool down and many bees have finished their life cycles for the year or are in a state of hibernation. A lot of bumblebee queens will have finished their foraging and found somewhere such as leaf litter, soft earth or under logs and they will hibernate there until the weather warms up in spring. Many solitary bees will also be overwintering as pupae or fully developed bees in cocoons and nest cells in sheltered areas. For this reason it is good to leave areas of your outdoor space untidied and not chopped back until spring - resist sweeping up that leaf litter and leave perennials uncut as this all makes great habitat for critters. If you disturb a hibernating bee or cocoon at this time of year, please replace it to the sheltered spot you found it. Although often a topic of debate, many people clean and store cocoons from bee hotels at this time of year too. Plenty of debate over the pros and cons of this can be found online!

On milder, sunny days during the winter you might see just Buff-tailed bumblebees and Honeybees. Winter active Buff -tail Bumblebees in the south (and spreading) are a relatively new pattern, very likely caused by climate change. Research is still taking place on this and the Bumblebee Conservation Trust (BBCT) encourages people to record winter active bees on iRecord (especially further north). Queens will have created new nests in the autumn rather than going into hibernation and these winter active bees will be looking for pollen and nectar, so having late flowering plants such as Mahonia, Winter-flowering Heather, Hellebore (and Lungwort for early spring) is really important. If you find a bumblebee caught out in wet or cold weather and it isn't active, the best course of action is either to pop it on a flowering plant nearby or pop it somewhere sheltered. You can give stranded bees a sugar water mix for a burst of energy (see BBCT website for guidance), but don't give them honey as this can pass on pathogens.

As well as having winter flowering plants in your outdoor space, now is a good time to be planting bulbs for the spring. Choose single flowers rather than double, meaning that bees can easily access the pollen and nectar from them. Another winter activity to support bees is tree planting, and as with flowering plants - the local area needs a selection of trees and plants that flower throughout the year. So do bear this in mind when choosing something.



Cookham Community Allotment

As I write we are still having sessions on the allotment. People are often surprised that we haven't put the plots 'to bed'. Now is the time when we put back some goodness into the soil to ensure productive and healthy crops the following year. To this end we are busy raking leaves and making leaf mould. We also cover bare soils with leaves and then membrane to hold them down. Over the winter months the leaves partly rot, and worms begin to take them into the soil. No double digging for us. We also leave remains of the earlier crops to rot into the soil. About six weeks ago huge courgette plants which had finished fruiting, were chopped up and left on the bed. There is now very little visible, it has decayed and returned to the soil from which it grew. Raking leaves from Westwood Green trees has proved very productive and warming!

This is also a good time to look back at the crops which have grown well and what we might try in the future. One of our gardeners chose to grow fenugreek and some Indian greens with some success. Along with the coriander and spinach we grow her mother has been busy preparing delicious curries through the year. Kohl rabi proved to be an acquired taste for many but brought back memories of Bavarian family recipes for one gardener. Physalis fruit proved to be a 'marmite plant'. Either you enjoy the sharp sweetness of the scented fruit, or it is not for you! Gardening can evoke many memories for people, whether it be the sights, tastes, or smells, good or bad, and these can then initiate lively conversations.

We do slowdown in December and gardeners have other commitments so our last Tuesday session will be Tuesday 5th December, and the last Saturday 9th December.

We will be able to meet up in January on Saturday morning January 13th 11.00-1.00. We will meet at the Methodist Church, Wesley Hall, Cookham. We will have the usual tool sharpening and cleaning session, sowing sweet peas and sorting out seeds etc, and soup making. We can use one of the squash stored from our produce. Our session will end with a soup lunch!

Hopefully weather willing, we will be able to return to working on our plots in February.

Anyone interested in coming along, or to have their tools sharpened (just make a small donation) is welcome on January 13th.

Gardening Tips December

There is no doubt that most gardens don't look their best in December and January, but "not at their best" doesn't mean that gardens can't still look good through the winter. Vibrantly coloured stems, evergreen trees and shrubs, statuesque silhouettes, frost-rimed seedheads and winter blossom can all contribute to a winter aesthetic that offers drama and interest.

For any readers who are looking out of their windows at a largely brown garden and wondering how to start introducing some winter interest our initial advice is to plan some trips and go and have a look at other gardens. Any garden that is open to visitors over the winter will have areas that are specifically designed for this time of year, so there will be plenty of ideas to inspire you. Take photos, record plant names and make notes (especially about plant sizes) and then have a look at your own plot to see what plants might work best in your space. A bit of further research will soon show you what plants look like in the rest of the year, so that you can be sure that any new additions will work in other seasons as well.

The amount of planting in larger gardens can be intimidating for those of us with smaller spaces, but lots of ideas are scalable. For example, although Wisley may have a whole border planted for winter stem colour, a couple of specimen plants can brighten up a much smaller space in the winter, while retreating into the background over the summer.

Here's a thermal image of a front door before and after a thermal lined curtain was put up. The difference in temperature is 9 degrees. It brings back memories of




front door - so sensible.

The benefits on both sides are enormous. Differences should be celebrated and what better time to do this than during the festive season.

The meeting on 9th November started with a brief business meeting before we moved on to a talk by Keith Le Page about The World War II German Occupation of Guernsev.

Keith was born in Guernsey and his parents lived there throughout the occupation, with his sister being born in 1941. Keith quoted from a fascinating book of the Revd Douglas Ord's diaries, which were discovered on Guernsey and edited by John Nettles who was attracted to the island after the filming of the series Bergerac. Revd Ord fought in the First World War and learnt German during that time, which subsequently proved very useful. After being demobbed he trained as a Methodist Minister and was posted to St Peter Port.

In June 1940 wartime holidays were being promoted on Guernsey but then, on 19th June, the evacuation of the island began, with parents given 24 hours to decide whether to evacuate their children to England. 5,000 children were evacuated, mostly to Stockport, where they were to remain for the duration of the war, some as young as 4 years old. The population of the island diminished from 43,000 to 23,000 very quickly. Keith's parents remained on the island. Then the Germans arrived, about 20,000 troops, and all communication with England ceased. Everyone was made to carry ID cards, drive on the right instead of the left. Properties were requisitioned and shortages began. One instance was a shortage of 1d stamps, so 2d stamps were cut in half! Shortage got very severe by 1943, with people dying from malnutrition. On 6th June 1944 the planes of the D Day landings could be heard on Guernsey. There was no food or fuel and by Nov 1944 and the situation was becoming unbearable.

May 9th, 1945 was liberation day on Guernsey!

A most interesting talk, brought to life with photographs, memorabilia, and Keith's family's personal recollections as well as Revd Ord's diaries.

Our December meeting will be our Christmas lunch, in the WI hall on Thurs 14th Dec at 12.30pm.

PPG Open Meeting on Health Services

This month's newsletter will focus on the very successful PPG event held at Pinder Hall on 19 October. The event attracted about 70 people, including some from other medical practices in the Maidenhead Primary Care Network and from our local Pharmacy. They were rewarded with excellent presentations from three keynote speakers, who explained the current organisations of the local NHS providers.

The PPG wishes to thank all those from the NHS who contributed to the presentations and discussions.

After a brief introduction from the Vice-Chair of the Cookham PPG, setting out the parameters for the event, **Dr Azmy Birdi**, a Partner at the Cookham Medical, introduced the speakers she had arranged for the evening:

<u>Dr Lalitha Iyer</u>, Chief Medical Officer of the Frimley Integrated Care Board, which lies within the Frimley Integrated Health and Care Integrated Care System (ICS). The Maidenhead Primary Care Network (MPCN), which covers the surgeries within the local area, is one of 16 PCNs in the ICS. The Frimley ICS has two defined objectives:

Reducing Health Inequalities for all our residents who experience unwarranted variation in their outcomes or experience.

Increased Healthy Life Expectancy for our whole population, ensuring an improvement not just in length of life but in the quality of those years as well.

Dr lyer explained how the ICS is structured and how it operates to deliver its objectives, demystifying many of the acronyms which can block a layman's understanding of the organisation.

It was noted that the Frimley Integrated Care Board has recently won an award for the most digitally accomplished ICB, and that Dr Iyer was also given the "Woman of the Year Health Hero" award.

<u>Dr Amy Lettis</u>, a salaried GP at the Cookham Surgery, who also does Maidenhead Primary Care GP sessions at St Mark's, including looking after refugee health, gave a more detailed view of the MPCN and the services it provides. MPCN is constituted as an independent limited company with its own Board of Directors, including representative GPs.

Services provided by the MPCN include Clinical Pharmacists, Social Prescribers, Health and Wellbeing Coaches, Care Co-ordinators, First Contact Physiotherapy, Dieticians, Mental Health Practitioner, Paramedic (attending to minor ailments), Physician Associates (not able to prescribe and working under the supervision of a GP, but very useful in providing first level GP contact with patients), Nurse Practitioner, Nurse Associate. These services are available at St Marks and in some cases at the Surgery. They are booked via the Surgery Receptionists. St Mark's also offers a Minor Injuries Service (appointments can be booked Mon-Fri on 03000 770319 or via the 111 service).

Social Prescribers, Katie and Sabine, described their

roles, providing patients with personalised non-medical services, perhaps signposting people to leisure activities, helping people find help with shopping, supporting carers in their roles, signposting home care support etc.

<u>Jill Stinchcombe</u>, the Practice Manager at Cookham, updated the meeting on the current staff strength at the Cookham Medical Centre:

Four Partners: Drs Azmy Birdi, Michael Sealy, Anu Swamy and Kenney Tsoi.

Salaried GPs: Drs Aimee Lettis and Anika Maudgil (currently on Maternity Leave).

Locum Cover: Drs Lettis, Clare Westcott and Parul Sappal (who also support Dr Birdi on Women's Health Clinics).

GP Registrar: Dr Crystal Yang – on rotation at Cookham until 09/2024.

Practice Nurse: Barbara Gall.

Healthcare Assistant: Cindy Wellman.

There is also access to MPCN Staff, either on site, or at the GP Service unit at St Mark's Hospital. These include Paramedic, First Contact Physio, Clinical Pharmacist, Physician Associate, Dietitian, Social Prescriber and Health Coach.

Other services at Saint Mark's Hospital, available on a shared basis via CMC Reception are:- Mental Health Practitioner, Home Visiting Service, Same day service – includes nurses, Advanced Nurse Practitioners, GPs and Physio, a pre-bookable evening and weekend GP service (delivered by East Berkshire Primary Care) and a Minor Injuries service, Monday – Friday, bookable directly on 0300 770319.

Access to the MPCN services is via the surgery. The reception care navigators are trained to direct patients to the most appropriate healthcare professional or service and will book directly. Dietitians or social prescribers are generally booked following a referral from the clinical team.

Where does the PPG go now? The Open Evening proved that there is a strong, and as yet, unfulfilled demand from the patient community for more information about local NHS services. With this in mind the Cookham PPG will analyse the feedback from 19 October and determine how best to move things forward. In short, a promising start which has opened the door for further information and discussion.

Congratulations to Dr Azmy Birdi! Everyone involved with the Cookham Medical Centre will want to join the PPG in offering Dr Birdi our heartiest congratulations on the recent announcement that she is one of two winners of the "FSRH Training Hero Award 2023". This is a well-deserved and very prestigious award. (For the record, FSRH stands for "Faculty of Sexual and Reproductive Healthcare")
