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Our new Vicar, Fr Stephen Mills, writes:

A Sacred Journey of Faith: Embracing the Role of Vicar of The Cookhams

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

What is the theme for 2024?

In three of the four gospels, Jesus is asked which commandment is the most important. He answers not with one commandment but with two: you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and soul and mind and strength, and you shall love your neighbour as yourself. Come and See shows how these two commandments can give a rhythm and a shape to our lives.

What does it involve?

Everyone who registers will receive a daily short email to reflect on, and a weekly short video from Bishop Steven exploring the themes in a bit more detail. The materials are suitable both for those who are exploring faith for the first time and those with an established faith. There are also special materials for family groups and schools. They receive a weekly email with a video message on the same theme, which is filmed by one of our school chaplains.

Methodist Minister Vicci Davidson writes:

Happy New Year to you all! I hope that it has been a good Christmas period for you and I expect that you and I both are settling down to that period of time in the New Year where the holidays have passed, but we are still occasionally caught out and end up writing 2023 when we meant 2024.

Over the Christmas holiday, I have been reading a book called "Thinking, Fast and Slow" by Daniel Kahneman and I have been particularly interested in what he calls "brain priming". This works on the idea that our brains work differently depending on what we set them off thinking of. So for example, if I talk to you about the importance of washing and ask you whether you prefer a bath or a shower and then show you the letters "S O - P" you are more likely to think that the missing letter is "A", whereas if I talk to you about lunch preferences, you are more likely to think that it is "U". It's the same phenomenon that means if you ask someone to spell "toast" three times and then ask them what you put in the toaster, they will usually say "toast" whereas the answer is "bread" or if you ask them to spell "milk" three times and then ask them what cows drink, they will answer "milk" whereas the answer is "water". Brain priming has been understood as mediated through jokes/brain teasers like these for years, but perhaps only now has it been scientifically observed and analysed.

What it means for us as Christians is, I think, quite significant. If we start the day with prayer and Bible reading, and the week with worship and listening to a thought-provoking sermon, we prime our brain to be open to the activity of God. If spelling "milk" three times makes us more likely to assert that "milk" is what cows drink, think how more keyed in to the presence of God we are likely to be if we have started our day and week with thinking about him. The more we pray, the more we are opening our minds to both ask and answer the question: "Where was God in that?"

I don't think that it is helpful for us to suddenly embark on a two hours a day prayer and Bible Study habit if we are used to the occasional prayer time and some quick arrow prayers in times of need, but I do think that the concept of "brain priming" does help us understand one of the reasons why it is good to try to pray more, to read our Bibles more, to go to church as regularly as possible.

Cookham Saint-Benoit Twinning

Having had a great visit to Saint-Benoit last October, we have started planning for the visit of Saint-Benoit to Cookham on 26th-29th October

this year. As usual, our visitors will be accommodated with local families, and there will be a mixture of cultural and social events, open to all.

Meanwhile France and Saint-Benoit are gearing up for the 2024 Olympics. The Olympic flame will be passing through Saint-Benoit on 25th May, on its way to a location in Poitiers to light a cauldron.

In the latest Saint-Benoit magazine, the Mayor encourages the people of Saint-Benoit to vote in the June European elections, and to increase the previous voter turn-out. The main article in the magazine is about the work in Saint-Benoit to restore the 'Arches of Parigny', the only remaining part of a Roman aqueduct dating from the first century which supplied Poitiers with drinking water.

We are grateful to our Cookham naturalist, Brian Clews, for writing a summary of the work done by WildCookham this year. We translated this into French, taking particular care with the names of the fauna covered, and have sent this over to Saint-Benoit, who we know are also keenly interested in their local environment. We look forward to receiving a similar response.

I find that watching buds swelling on trees and plants during the winter months gives me a tremendous sense of hope. After creation's winter shutdown, the sight of tiny flowers poking out of brown earth may be more important than ever.

Getting outdoors during daylight hours, enjoying green spaces and getting some fresh air and exercise are great ways to keep ourselves healthy at any time of year. A psychologist colleague wrote, "Attending to the details of nature can also inspire awe, which has been linked to positive mood and increased life satisfaction." I expect it is this sense of awe that makes it easier for many of us to connect with God outdoors.

Helping ourselves and others to thrive is a good start to 2024, but it is also vital to have hope for the future. In the face of climate change, we urgently need to care for all of Creation, both human and everything else, with God's help.

Our ultimate hope is in God's promise that He will bring about a new heaven and a new earth. We can look forward to the day when Creation will be fully redeemed and liberated from evil. The Greek word used to describe the new creation is the same as that used to describe someone who becomes a Christian, whose humanity is restored and renewed. There will be continuity between the old and new earth as it is cleansed and purified, surpassing and perfecting what has gone before. There will also be some discontinuity, as there will be no more suffering or death.

So, one source of hope for 2024 is that we can enjoy both caring for and meeting God in Creation. But the parts of Creation that we find most beautiful, giving us a sense of awe and helping us to worship, are also a reminder that there is something much better to come.

All in the month of February

100 years ago, on 5th Feb 1924, BBC Radio broadcast the 'six-pips' Greenwich Time Signal for the first time.

90 years ago, on 23rd Feb 1934, Edward Elgar, the British composer, died.

70 years ago, on 23rd Feb 1954, the first field test of the polio vaccine began in Pittsburgh. It grew into a year-long national trial involving 1.8 million children.

50 years ago, on 7th Feb 1974, Conservative Prime Minister Edward Heath called a snap general election following the miners' strike and three-day week. It resulted in a hung parliament, and the Labour leader, Harold Wilson, became Prime Minister.



Oswald of Worcester - the saint for Leap Year

There is a saint for Leap Year: He is St Oswald of Worcester, who died on 29th February 992. His family story was extraordinary, and full of some surprising 'leaps', all by itself. It

provides a tantalising glimpse of what happened to at least one of those pagan Viking warriors who settled in Anglo-Saxon Britain.

For Oswald's great-uncle had come to England c 865, as part of the 'Great Heathen Army' of Viking invaders. But his son, Oswald's uncle, Oda, forsook paganism, and not only converted to Christianity, but actually ended up as Archbishop of Canterbury. From there, Oda was in a position to help his nephew, Oswald, which he did.

Oda sent young Oswald to be educated at the abbey of Fleury, then a great centre of learning. There Oswald absorbed the Benedictine ideals which would guide his later life and work. Back in England, he became bishop of Worcester in 961, and with the support of King Edgar, eagerly joined in major reforms of the Anglo-Saxon church. In 972 Oswald was made Archbishop of York, and seems to have taken a great interest in renewing the church in the Danelaw. He founded Ramsey Abbey, which became one of the great Fenland monasteries.

Oswald was popular as an archbishop, and always washed the feet of the poor every Lent. On 29th February 992 he had just completed this service at Worcester when he collapsed and died. In later years, Worcester adopted both him and Wulfstan to be its two chief saints: they flank the tomb of King John, which is before the high altar in the cathedral.

14th February - Valentine's Day

There are two confusing things about this day of romance and anonymous love-cards strewn with lace, cupids and ribbon: firstly, there seems to have been two different Valentines in the 4th century - one a priest martyred on the Flaminian Way, under the emperor Claudius, the other a bishop of Terni martyred at Rome. And neither seems to have had any clear connection with lovers or courting couples.

So why has Valentine become the patron saint of romantic love? By Chaucer's time the link was assumed to be because on these saints' day -14th February - the birds are supposed to pair. Or perhaps the custom of seeking a partner on St Valentine's Day is a surviving scrap of the old Roman Lupercalia festival, which took place in the middle of February. One of the Roman gods honoured during this Festival was Pan, the god of nature. Another was Juno, the goddess of women and marriage. During the Lupercalia it was a popular custom for young men to draw the name of a young unmarried woman from a name -box. The two would then be partners or 'sweethearts' during the time of the celebrations. Even modern Valentine decorations bear an ancient symbol of love -Roman cupids with their bows and love-arrows.

There are no churches in England dedicated to Valentine, but since 1835 his relics have been claimed by the Carmelite church in Dublin.

George Herbert, priest and poet

If we were to name someone prominent from the 17th century, we might mention Rembrandt or Shakespeare. It is unlikely we would remember George Herbert. However, he was a prolific writer, a gifted speaker and musician. His hymns are still sung today.



Herbert was born into a wealthy family in Mid-Wales on 3rd April 1593. His father was a Member of Parliament who died when Herbert was three years old. His mother moved her large family to London where, aged 12, Herbert entered Westminster School. In 1609, his mother remarried, and Herbert left home to be a student at Trinity College, Cambridge.

By the age of 23, Herbert had graduated with two degrees. He was fluent in Latin and Greek and in 1620 was elected as the University's Public Orator. He held this position for seven years, and for a short time was MP in his hometown in Wales.

Although Herbert was securing an illustrious future and his speeches had gained the attention of King James 1, he was restless. He felt God was calling him to the priesthood and much of Herbert's poetry expressed his inner spiritual conflicts.

When the King died in 1625, and two influential patrons also died at about the same time, Herbert responded to God's call on his life and gave up his secular ambitions. He married in 1629 and became a priest in a small Anglican church in Bemerton in Wiltshire.

Here he found inner peace at last, serving God in the local community. His poetic talent continued to flourish along with his musicianship as a skilled lutenist. After only three years as a priest, he died of tuberculosis on 1st March 1633. He was 39.

Some ninety of Herbert's poems have been set to music by such composers as Ralph Vaughan Williams and Benjamin Britten. His most well-known hymns are Teach me my God and King, Let all the world in every corner sing and King of glory, king of peace.

A number of artistic commemorations of Herbert exists in several churches and cathedrals including a stained-glass window in Westminster Abbey and a statue at the front of Salisbury Cathedral.

George Herbert is remembered on the 27th February.

Candlemas, The Presentation of Christ in the Temple - 2nd February

In bygone centuries, Christians said their last farewells to the Christmas season on Candlemas, 2nd February. This is exactly 40 days after Christmas Day itself.

In New Testament times 40 days old was an important age for a baby boy: it was when they made their first 'public appearance'. Mary, like all good Jewish mothers, went to the Temple with Jesus, her first male child - to 'present Him to the Lord'. At the same time, she, as a new mother, was 'purified'. Thus, we have the Festival of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple.

So, where does the Candlemas bit come in? Jesus is described in the New Testament as the Light of the World, and early Christians developed the tradition of lighting many candles in celebration of this day. The Church also fell into the custom of blessing the year's supply of candles for the church on this day - hence the name, Candlemas.

The story of how Candlemas began can be found in Luke 2:22-40. Simeon's great declaration of faith and recognition of who Jesus was is of course found in the Nunc Dimittis, which is embedded in the Office of Evening Prayer in the West. But in medieval times, the Nunc Dimittis was mostly used just on this day, during the distribution of candles before the Eucharist. Only gradually did it win a place in the daily prayer life of the Church.

A Prayer for February 2024



Abandoned and helpless

The RSPCA reports that animal abandonment incidents have reached a three-year high.

Latest figures for 2023 reveal more than 20,000 reports of animals being simply dumped by their owners.

Dermot Murphy, RSPCA inspectorate commissioner, says: "Behind these shocking statistics are thousands of vulnerable animals. Each one is a valuable life in urgent need of our help."

He goes on: "The combined effects of the pandemic and the ongoing cost-of-living crisis has created a perfect storm, and means we expect more animals than ever will need our help this year."

Yet many rescue centres are already full to bursting, "so we are facing an unprecedented winter crisis. Our rescue teams are busier than ever. We need animal lovers to donate to help us be there for animals in desperate need."





How are your waterworks?

The recent flooding was perhaps an over-reaction to our call for more people to create water features in their gardens! But our public event late last year is, we hope, encouraging us all to get out there before Spring to create one of the essential wildlife habitats. As the UK's wildlife trusts point out "water is essential for wildlife to thrive, but it isn't just for drinking. Amphibians like newts, frogs and toads use water as shelter and breeding grounds. Butterflies get valuable minerals and salts from slightly muddy water, and birds use water to bathe and remove parasites". It does not have to be a large area: just an old sink or bucket can really help. And there's plenty of advice around with ideas on how to create a really valuable water habitat (here's the wildlife trust advice - www.wildlifetrusts.org/actions/how-provide-water-wildlife.

That's all part of the call to all of us with gardens, window boxes, indeed any space for wildlife to join the many Cookhamites who have already been making a difference in this way. There'll be more about this when we launch the 2024 Wildlife Gardens Awards in March.

There's plenty for us to celebrate this year, the tenth since

Cookham Wildlife Supporters launched back in 2014. Look out for events to mark this during the year, starting with our first 2024 volunteer evening on 16th February (7pm at the parish centre, Holy Trinity Church in Cookham village). We have around 100 people now who have offered to do something for nature and we would love to see more, with help needed in many ways - 'hands on' roles with practical outdoor help, supporting us in areas such as technology, planning and administrative roles, contributing photos and ideas on our Facebook page. Contact us at wildcookham@gmail.com to discuss how you can help.

One of the hands on jobs comes up on 25th February when you can give an hour or two to help prepare our Harris Woodbridge Reserve for the coming Spring. Sign up via www.meetup.com/WildCookham.

Early Spring Bee News

Sadly, hibernating bumblebee queens won't have fared well with the recent flooding we have had as they often overwinter underground. But the bumblebees that have chosen to hibernate in higher ground, away from the floodplain, will hopefully have survived. They will slowly start to emerge as the weather warms up and are really quite big. The cold weather isn't too much of an obstacle though - bumblebees are well designed for cooler temperatures - they have insulated furry bodies and are able to dislocate their wings from their flight muscles and vibrate themselves to warm up. Although you're more likely to see them on milder, sunny days, they can be found foraging at temperatures as low as 0degC. Brrr.

Buff-tailed bumblebees and honeybees are really the only bees you'll see in the winter months, but as temperatures start to creep up, one of the first garden visitors will be the hairy footed flower bee (Anthophora plumipes).

This is one of my favourite bees, the male is aptly named as his middle legs have a very hairy foot at the end. These bees are often mistaken for bumblebees as they are quite stout and furry, but they are a type of solitary bee and don't have queens and workers in a nest. Males are a mostly ginger colour, with the females being all black (apart from orange hairs on their back legs) and they both have a very 'zippy' type of flight.

Great plants to have in your outdoor space for these bees are lungworts (Pulmonaria sp), deadnettles and comfrey.

RHS Wisley has a cob wall that is a popular spot for nesting hairy footed flower bees, where you can watch them coming and going - males looking for mates and females making individual nest cells. You might also spot one of their cleptoparasites - the common mourning bee (Melecta albifrons). I spotted my first of these bees in one of the Maidenhead parks last year. They are quite a distinctive black bee with pale markings and generally point out a local population of hairy footed flower bees. Get out spring bee spotting!

URGENT HELP NEEDED AT COOKHAM VOUNTARY SERVICES



A chance to take part in a key local community service!

CVS is a local self-funding community organisation, which provides an essential role taking people who need help with transport to get to medical appointments. We depend entirely on volunteers to

meet the needs of members of the community.

Due to retirements and movements out of the area, we are desperately short of volunteers. If you live locally and have some spare time available, can you help?

We need volunteers in two areas: -

- Office volunteers to give 2-3 hours, one morning a week, in our office at Elizabeth House. The role involves receiving requests from patients needing transport and matching them with an available volunteer driver.
- 2. Drivers. There are no set times for drivers. If you are offered a run, it is entirely up to you whether you take it. We cover a wide range of destinations from the Cookham Surgery and St Mark's Hospital to occasional journeys to a London Teaching Hospital. We do not pay drivers a fee, but we do pay mileage rate and cover parking and other charges.

Remembering those who live in Care Homes

In 2022, there were 408,371 people living in care homes across the United Kingdom according to the census.

Some residents enjoy regular visits from family or friends, while others lead a very lonely life. Some will 'pass on' relatively quickly, while others may live in the same room for several years.

Some residents are collected for church, and some join church services in their Home, while others resort to radio or television for spiritual encouragement. Only a relative few have the technical competence and equipment to livestream.

What does this mean for church leaders? It is likely they will have some church members or ex-members living in Care Homes. While for some, live-streaming of services will be a huge blessing, they do not replace regular visiting, if possible.

Giving elderly people the opportunity to go outside (in their wheelchair) will normally be enthusiastically welcomed, and, for some, especially the opportunity to attend Sunday service in their wheelchair.

A visiting team from the Church to take a regular service is not only an encouragement to believers, but can also be a gentle encouragement to those without faith, particularly if accompanied by a regular opportunity for Communion (for believers) and hymn singing (favourites) for those with Sunday School and Church memories.

Here in The Cookhams, we regularly visit Harwood House in our benefice.

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Cookham Community Allotment

Wishing everyone a fruitful and vegetableful 2024!

We ended 2023 by collecting and spreading fallen leaves on our beds, giving protection to any crops and to feed the worms and improve our soil. During most of December and January we have left the ground and plants to the elements. They have been battered by the winds (which blew our large storage shed right over!) drenched by the rain, frozen to the core...what next we wonder? We will soon be back on the plots to prepare for the sowing and planting to follow once the soil warms up. In the meantime there will be repairs to make, wood chip to spread and fruit bushes to prune.

During January we met up in the Wesley Hall to clean and sharpen our own and the Allotment's cutting tools. We also sowed sweet peas for the plots and propagated house plants for ourselves and for the plant sale to be held at the beginning of March. We had a good turnout for this morning's activities and we ended by sharing a bowl of homemade vegetable soup together (beans and squash came from our Allotment). Gardening Tips February

A belated Happy New Year everyone. This year we're going to go back to our first gardening love – growing edibles. We're planning to cover all sorts of growing from windowsills, through pots and containers to larger gardens and allotments, so hopefully there'll be something for everyone.

With the new year having been both wet and cold so far, there has not been much venturing outside. However, there are things that can be done indoors at this time of year to get ready for the growing season ahead. We start sowing some seeds in the winter. These are the plants that will need a long growing season such as chilli and sweet peppers, aubergines, leeks and onions and it is not too late to get these underway in early February. It is also not too late to get seed orders in with the mail order companies, or to head to a garden centre to see what takes your fancy.

You can also sow now for a quick indoor crop by growing either sprouts or microgreens. Beansprouts (usually mung beans) are well known from oriental cooking. They can be bought from seed suppliers and sown on a tray where the bottom is covered with a layer of well-dampened material (e.g. a tea towel) or cotton wool. Wash the beans and soak them overnight in cold water. Wash again in cold water before spreading evenly on the damp substrate. Cover with polythene or clingfilm to keep humidity high and then with brown paper or newspaper to eliminate light. The sprouts should be ready to eat after about a week when just over 2cm tall. Remove the sprouts from the beans, rinse thoroughly and cook for a couple of minutes.

CLOSING CURTAINS AT NIGHT COULD REDUCE DRAUGHTS AND ENERGY BY UP TO 20%

That's an incredible figure and obviously depends on the glazing in your windows and whether the curtains or blinds have thermal linings. But it really can make an enormous difference. Once the sun has dropped there's a noticeable arctic chill in the air at the moment, and that's when everyone should dash around closing blinds and curtains. Keep in the heat £££.

If you're having issues with condensation on the inside of windows there are several ways to manage it:

- Clear up any condensation each morning to prevent mould occurring.
- Avoid drying clothes on radiators and in the house as much as possible. If you have no choice, do it in one room like the bathroom, keeping the door shut and either open a window, or use a low energy dehumidifier.
- Always use an extract fan or open a window when cooking or showering.
- Monitor humidity levels with a humidistat. (currently about £8 on Amazon). If the level exceeds 60%, then open the window and let some cooler and dryer


air in. High humidity can cause mould and has been linked to the development of asthma.

Our recent parent survey results were overwhelmingly positive and it really underlines the education we are delivering.





Cookham Dean WI



For our first meeting of the year on January 8th, we invited our old friend Brian Clews to speak about 'Wildlife of the Jubilee River'. When we booked this talk little did we know that our part of the Thames Valley would be experiencing the worst floods since 2014!

Brian showed us interesting pictures of Cookham under water in the last century and of the construction of the Jubilee River which was intended to ameliorate flooding in the Maidenhead/Windsor area (or as several members audibly commented push the problem down river to Staines!). The project began in the 1990s and in 2002 the eleven-mile channel was completed and opened by the Duke of York on July 11th.

Around Dorney the Jubilee River was the opportunity to create new wetland habitats -reed beds, scrapes islands, new plantations, grasslands and scrub - designed as refuges for a variety of species. There are now otters and water voles. Bird life flourishes thanks to the proliferation of other life necessary for an avian diet in the river and the wetland. As well as all year species such as ducks and swans it has become an important 'stop over' for Spring and Summer migrants.

Brian showed us some excellent photographs of rarer birds who have been sighted: the elusive water rail, Cetti's and reed warblers, and lapwings – once a common sight on farmland, plovers, snipe and bearded tits. (Is it bearded or even a tit?) Short eared owls have been sighted and should you have heard booming - a few pairs of bitterns have made Dorney their home.

Brian also gave us details of Wild Cookham's 2024 initiative inviting us to go 'On Safari' in our gardens. He will pass the details to the Secretary. Marion Elly thanked him for a highly entertaining talk which brightened a gloomy January afternoon.

WI business at the meeting included members voting for the Resolution they would like NFWI to put to members at their Annual Meeting in June. Topics this year were: Dental Health Matters, Problems caused by Substandard Housing, Gambling Advertising, and Improving Outcomes for Women in the Criminal Justice System. The Secretary will e-mail members details of the new WI Learning Hub.

Medical Centre News.

Dr Azmy Birdi, a Practice Partner, is actively involved in women's health issues. She reports that a national research study has been launched to produce a report as the basis for building an economic case for the continued funding of the Women's Health Strategy for England, while driving the need for intersectional gender equality in healthcare more broadly. The economic modelling will be complimented by the testimonies of "experts of experience" (i.e. those with lived experience of a given condition), to ensure that women's voices remain central throughout this undertaking.

The study group set up a series of roundtables for those with lived experience of various conditions. Regrettably, these roundtables took place in January, before this newsletter went to press. The sessions covered a number of key conditions:

Fibroids, Polycystic ovary syndrome (PCOS), Menopause, Dysmenorrhea (pain during menstruation) and/or heavy menstrual bleeding, Endometriosis/ Adenomyosis, Infertility

For more details of this project, or if you would like to contribute your experiences to the study, please contact the project leader – bridget.gornham@nhsconfed.org. It is emphasised that "Chatham House Rules" apply to any and all contributions to the study.
