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Fr Stephen Mills, writes:

Journey of Faith: From Lent to Easter in Our Parish Community

Greetings from the vicarage,

As we journey through the reflective season of Lent, our hearts and minds are drawn towards the forthcoming celebration of Easter, falling this year on the 31st of March. This time of year, steeped in deep spiritual significance, invites us to pause, reflect, and prepare ourselves for the resurrection of Christ, a cornerstone of our faith that fills us with an indomitable hope.

In the spirit of communal reflection and fellowship, our parish will proudly continue its cherished tradition of the Walk of Witness on Good Friday. This poignant event sees members of our church and the wider community come together, embodying the journey Jesus made towards the cross. As we walk, carrying a cross through our streets and pausing at stations to contemplate the profound sacrifice of Jesus, we are reminded of the weight of this act and the profound love it represents. This shared experience not only deepens our connection to our faith but also to each other, as we walk in solidarity and reflection.

Following the walk, we shall gather to share hot cross buns, a practice rich in Christian symbolism. The cross on top of each bun serves as a poignant reminder of the crucifixion, while the spices within are reminiscent of those used to embalm Christ at His burial. This simple, yet deeply symbolic act of breaking bread together serves as a moment of communal reflection of the sacrifice made by Jesus, and the hope and salvation it brings. It's also a tasty treat to be enjoyed by all.

As Lent draws to a close, we also celebrate the return of what we have willingly set aside during this holy season. This act of sacrifice, mirroring Jesus' 40 days in the wilderness, is a testament to our faith and resilience, bringing us closer to understanding the depth of His trials and His ultimate victory over death. It's a journey that not only prepares us for the joy of Easter but also deepens our appreciation for the abundance and grace that flows into our lives.

Easter Sunday, the day we celebrate the Resurrection of Christ, is the high point of the church's year and a profound expression of the hope we carry within us. The empty tomb on that first Easter morning reveals the victory of life over death, love over hatred, and light over darkness. It is this hope that sustains us, that brings light into our darkest moments, and reaffirms the promise of new life.

John Donne, a revered poet and cleric in the Church of England, encapsulates this triumphant sentiment in his sonnet "Death Be Not Proud." Penned in the early 17th century, around 1610-1617, Donne's words resonate with the profound victory of faith over mortality.

"Death, be not proud, though some have called thee Mighty and dreadful, for thou art not so; For those whom thou think'st thou dost overthrow, Die not, poor Death, nor yet canst thou kill me."

Donne's defiance of death and his celebration of eternal life through Christ's resurrection resonate with the very essence of Easter. It reminds us that in Christ, death is not an end but a doorway to a new beginning, a new life in the presence of God.

As we approach Holy Week, I extend a warm invitation to each of you to join us in the array of services we have planned. From the solemnity of Maundy Thursday, as we remember the Last Supper, to the reflective sorrow of Good Friday, and culminating in the jubilant celebration of Resurrection Sunday, each service is an opportunity to walk closer with Christ through the events that define our faith.


Let us embrace this Lenten season and the coming of Easter as a time for renewal, reflection, and rejoicing. In our walks, in our sacrifices, and in our gatherings, we are



reminded of the profound love that Christ has for each of us, a love that overcame even death itself. This Easter, let us hold fast to the hope of the Resurrection, letting it fill our hearts with joy and our lives with the light of Christ.

I look forward to walking with you, breaking bread with you, and celebrating with you as we journey through this most holy season together. May this time of Lent and the celebration of Easter bring you closer to the heart of God, filled with the peace and hope that comes from knowing Christ is risen, indeed.

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Looking forward to a warm and welcoming church



Holy Trinity Church is an important part of Cookham's history and potentially of its future. It is a beautiful mediaeval building

recognised nationally as a Grade 2* Listed Building. It has been standing at the heart of Cookham Village for some 1,000 years and, as evidenced by the recent archaeological digs on the church paddock, it has been a site of Christian worship since Anglo-Saxon times.

But just as the Anglo-Saxon Cookham Abbey was more than just a monastery but a centre of community activity, so today's church does not just bring together the Christian community for worship and prayer and to celebrate the great Christian holidays, but, much more than that, it provides a venue for music and drama and for community celebration and remembrance.

In this context the church's role has remained unchanged over all the centuries since Queen Cynethryth and her Cookham Abbey. It is vital that the church is continually adapted to keep the fabric sound and of practical value for today's parishioners.

The building has to be able to meet the needs of the 21st century, just as it has had to do during every century since the existing building was first built in the 12th century. Although major improvements were made in 2009, followed by emergency repairs to the tower a few years later, the last major reordering of the church was in 1861. The needs of the Victorian community were very different from those of today.

When the already very inefficient heating system finally breathed its last in 2019, the church was left without any heating. A temporary fix using a diesel fired marquee heater has been inefficient and totally inadequate and cannot survive much longer. Meanwhile the church can be freezing cold and very inhospitable.

Those who have attended an event in the church will know that the nearest toilets are 50 yards away in the Holy Trinity Parish Centre. The Victorian pews are uncomfortable and constrain the use of the church for not just music and drama, but also for more flexible forms of worship. The Parochial Church Council (PCC) committed to carry out a major re-ordering of the church, to make it fit for purpose for both 2024 and to future-proof it for a century or more ahead.

The project started in 2017. Working with experienced architects and consultants, the PCC created a plan for the church which delivered the PCC's Vision for Holy Trinity over the next many generations. For a building of this national importance and significance it is vital that everything is done properly and that both internal and external stakeholders are given the chance to comment on the development of an important religious, cultural and archaeological asset. This has not proved an easy task and has involved a great deal of negotiation and compromise, on all sides, but we are now delighted to report that the Diocesan Chancellor has finally agreed our

plans. This is good news for not just the church, but for the entire community for whom Holy Trinity is a valuable asset.

We plan to install underfloor heating in the nave and south aisle, and supplementary radiators there and in the east end which has not been heated in living memory. The underfloor heating will provide background heat and the radiators will be used to raise the temperature when the church is going to be in use.

We will have to remove the pews and the wooden platforms that support them and lay a new level cream coloured stone floor, using material similar to that used in the east end. We will replace the pews with moveable, stacking seating, to the same design as those in use in the



Parish Centre, but with wood style seats and backs. This will give us more flexibility for worship and for social and cultural events and expose the rather fine medieval pillars, which are currently boxed in. We know that some people will miss the pews, but they were poorly constructed, some are loose, and could not easily be made selfstanding. However, if anyone is interested in buying some, please let us know.

We are now moving urgently with our consultants to get the plans up to the stage where they can be put out to tender and for us to get a final cost. We have already been able to raise some £500,000 but know that we will need a lot more. We have a team working on how to raise the remaining funds and are obviously anxious to carry out the work as soon as possible. We will keep the community of Cookham updated on a regular basis with the progress we make.

Very importantly, now that we are at the practical stage of delivering the plan the more help we can get the better. If you feel that this is a worthwhile cause and would like to volunteer your time to help with the massive planning and communication issues we face, do not hesitate to get in touch with one of the Churchwardens.

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

Methodist Minister Vicci Davidson writes:

Friends,

I write this just before going on leave for a week, and by the time you read it, I will have returned. I am not convinced by the latest research that says that after you have had a week's leave from work, there is no more benefit to be had by further time off. I feel as if I need to spend a week sleeping before I can even start on leave, but I am sure that by the time I return, I shall be raring to go again!

The Jewish people were unique among the tribes of the Ancient Near East in insisting that there should be one day off in seven, and they believed that God himself had only rested on that very first Sabbath Day. God's work is constant in holding the universe, but on that seventh day of creation, God created rest.


We are so very good at using the other things that God created, sometimes in ways that can be seen as reckless, abusive or damaging. For example, our need for fast cars and instant gratification has driven much of the climate change we see today. Yet we don't over-use the idea of Sabbath – indeed often we don't use it enough.

In his book "Sabbath as Resistance" the theologian Walter Brueggemann suggests that in a world where we are constantly enjoined to study, work and get on in life, insisting on times of rest is an act of resistance in and of itself. It demands that people take time to reflect and to relax, and in slowing us down, it allows time for us to hear God speak – to say nothing of reducing stress levels and high blood pressure!

Keeping Sabbath, Brueggemann argues, is not about keeping rules, but about becoming a healthy person and restoring a healthy society. In a 24/7 culture of consumption where living seems to be something we do in order to achieve, accomplish, perform and possess, keeping the Sabbath allows us to break the cycle of wanting more of everything, and instead encourages us to focus on what is truly important: God, other people, all of life. The simple act of keeping the Sabbath can move us to a simpler but also more complete life.

Perhaps, as I take my Sabbath through leave, I will find this to be true, although there always seems to be something to do. However, my hope is that in this time of Lent, reflection and fasting, we may all find something of the wholeness that God wills for us.



The walk will start at Cookham Dean church at 11.30, reaching Holy Trinity church about 1.00pm, where refreshments will be available in the Parish Centre. Why





A Cookham Writer's Tale



Turning 60 was a significant time for me. I was shortly to become a grandfather for the first time and had decided to scale back my business to make more time for family and my own interests. Like a lot of people, I'd thought about writing a book for many years. In my case an action story inspired by my experiences as a young English man visiting family and friends in Northern Ireland during The Troubles. I'd often wondered if I would ever get around to writing the book and this seemed the perfect time to confront my procrastination.

I found myself doing research about the various organisations that existed at the time, the politics of the situation and the many sad and shocking events that rocked the province during those years.

I wanted to share some of those feelings and events, using a real timeline of events while weaving in a range of characters, and a pacey plot to hopefully include the sense of danger that I had felt at times whilst there. Definitely fiction, but believable fiction based on some of my own experiences in those years.

Lockdown became an unexpected catalyst, turning my research and ideas into action. I finally started writing. During my daily exercise walking around Cookham or cycling its hills my mind raced with ideas and the rest of the day was spent writing them down.

The result? 'Absence of Certainty' a novel that offers insights into a pivotal period in Northern Ireland's history but is also, I am told, a fast paced and enjoyable 'page turner'. It took several years and a sizeable re-write following feedback from a literary agent who recognised the book's potential, but in 2023 I finally got there. A publisher showed interest and now it is available for others to read. I have to say I have enjoyed every minute of the process and the satisfaction of getting my first novel 'over the line' is immense.





Lets get outside

Spring is upon us and with that come plenty of opportunities to get outside with WildCookham. The 2024 Wildlife Gardens Awards get the green light on 29th March with a Borough-wide launch. If you're not already involved go to <u>https://wildlifegardensawards.org</u> for loads of ideas for how to make your garden a better home for wildlife. This year we are really keen to increase the number of ponds across Cookham: it doesn't matter what size, we just need more water features because of the dramatic impact they can have for our wildlife. It's not too late to start work on one and there's plenty of advice available.

We have a number of walks planned in April and May. These get booked up quickly so go to our Meetup site now to confirm your place. There are outings with local naturalist Brian Clews on 23rd March in Maidenhead Thicket and he's in Bisham Woods on 22nd April . You can learn about the bluebell woods and linked wildflower meadow at Little Harwood on 16th April and again on the 8th May. We have a walk to coincide with International Dawn Chorus Day on 8th May. And start getting ready for Cookham's Big Wildlife Weekend on 22nd/23rd June: more on this page.

Big Cookham Wildlife Weekend

Our gardens are the nearest bit of the creation to where we live. But what lives alongside us within its trees, plants and soils? It is amazing what variety can indeed be found if we look closely enough.

In celebration of our tenth anniversary WildCookham are inviting all residents to join in on June 22nd/23rd to see how many different types of wildlife you can find in your gardens.

In preparation we are suggesting a pond be created in as many gardens as possible and a free booklet is available to help with suggestions and design from <u>brian.clews@btconnect.com</u>. Even a small one makes all

the difference. In addition, we are asking every garden-owner to create a small wildflower patch, even if just 1 metre square. We are

small wildflower patch, even if just 1 metre square. We are making packets of seeds available with just the amount to achieve that. We will be donating a free packet to each child in the four village primary schools and extra packets will be available from Daisy Love Café (in the Parade) - £1 each.

Our traditional wildlife is struggling in our heavily-worked countryside but our gardens can be veritable nature reserves for birds, insects, mini-beasts and the like. Join us in celebrating what variety we have and be prepared to be amazed how many you will find in your own garden. A village-wide initiative and great fun for the children,

Spring Bee News from Michelle Hunt

Spring has certainly arrived especially early this year and I've seen quite a few Buff-tail Bumblebee queens already.

They're pretty hard to miss and I always liken them to chinook helicopters - massive bees with a low drone. They're out and about getting provisions ready for nesting and as mentioned in most of these little bee updates - it's super important to have nectar and pollen available all year round for bees.

We've recently put some mahonia in our garden so we've got winter flowers available and it brings lovely colour to the garden in the colder months.

You will often see these queens flying back and forth over the ground looking for suitable nesting spots. They need somewhere dry and sheltered and old rodent nests are popular. Here the queen will make use of any dry material, create a cosy chamber and start making cups out of wax secreted by her body. She will collect nectar to store in these cups as provisions and lay her first eggs. Almost like a chicken, the queen will sit on these eggs to keep them warm by shivering her flight muscles to make heat. The eggs will develop into larvae and the queen will have to balance keeping these first eggs and larvae attended to, whilst leaving the nest to get provisions for both herself and her young. Many new queens and their nests fail at this stage.

The larvae spin cocoons and inside these the new bumblebees start to develop. Did you know that when the bumblebees eventually work their way out of their pupa, they are actually a silvery white colour? The bee needs to dry, harden and change colour before they are ready to leave the nest. This first batch of new bumblebees will all be female workers off to find provisions for the nest and the next batch of offspring.

Other bees to keep your eyes peeled for in March include Tree Bumblebees (Bombus hypnorum), Early Bumblebees (Bombus pratorum), Red Mason Bees (Osmia bicornis) and some of the early flying mining bees.

CVS is a local self-funding community organisation, which provides an essential role taking people who need help with transport to get to medical appointments. We depend entirely on volunteers to

meet the needs of members of the community.

Due to retirements and movements out of the area, we are desperately short of volunteers. If you live locally and have some spare time available, can you help?

We need volunteers in two areas: -

- 1. Office volunteers to give 2-3 hours, one morning a week, in our office at Elizabeth House. The role involves receiving requests from patients needing transport and matching them with an available volunteer driver.
- 2. Drivers. There are no set times for drivers. If you are offered a run, it is entirely up to you whether you take it. We cover a wide range of destinations from the Cookham Surgery and St Mark's Hospital to occasional journeys to a London Teaching Hospital. Cookham Community Allotment

February may seem very early to some people to start back on the allotment, but then that depends on why you have an allotment! The weather is not usually encouraging being either very wet or very cold, or both. The soil does not benefit from being walked on in these conditions and it can be far too sticky to start pulling out unwanted plants. Seeds will not germinate in cold wet soil. We have no sheds in which to shelter and sort out pots or packets of seeds. Yet, there we were at the start of February, a small bunch of enthusiasts ready to return to the plots and get busy, despite the grey damp skies.

The weather has recently been mild enough to allow early daffodils to open and greet us where we planted them, by the entrance gates. Many others are pushing their way through the soil, likely to bloom in time for Mothering Sunday. As we walk along the lumpen grass, past other plots, some huddled in their winter gloom, others already being smartened up with neat rows of burgeoning onions, we come to our plots. Already early rhubarb is pushing its rich red stems through the cold soil, enticing us with visions of rhubarb cake to come. Fallen leaves, spread over the beds in autumn, are providing a protective mulch and feeding the worms. Leeks are valiantly growing, offering ideas for warming soup. The kale has been feeding the pigeons who happily took advantage of the absence of protective net, blown off by recent winds. After re-covering the cage we could start harvesting it again, and anticipate tasty kale crisps. The chard weathered the cold temperatures of winter and will soon be producing more tasty leaves for soup, as does the hardy spinach. Our small harvest of carrots sown late autumn, were dug up by our newest two-year-old gardening recruit. There are plenty of other tidying, trimming and pruning tasks to be undertaken before we will be ready to start growing our new seasons crops.

There is good reason to visit the plots if only for the small but useful harvest. But there is more to it than that.

Despite the damp, we can put up a protective cover at the end of our sessions, warm ourselves with a hot drink and share some seasonal cake. It is good to be back together again, catch up with family news and discuss what we are hoping to grow. On the allotment we find fresh air, food and friendship in abundance. That is worth coming for.

If you would like to join in with sessions on the Community Allotment, do come and give it a go. All age groups welcome. We meet every Tuesday and Saturday 10.00-11.30 on the Alfred Major allotment site. You join in with as little or as much as you want and come as and when you are free. No experience necessary.

World Water Day - 22nd March

World Water Day became a UN observance day in 1993.

It wants to focus attention on the global water crisis, and raise awareness of the 2.2 billion people still living without access to safe water. It hopes to inspire action to tackle the water and sanitation crisis. This year, World Water Day 2024 will focus on the theme, 'Leveraging Water for Peace'.





March

For our kitchen garden, March is a key month for sowing seeds. This month we'll be sowing sweet and chilli peppers and tomatoes (at the end of the month) in heated propagators, brassicas, beetroot and peas in an unheated greenhouse and possibly carrots and parsnips in open ground. We sow peas in root trainers and the young plants will be planted out directly from the trainers. For almost everything else we will sow in seed trays and prick out the seedlings and grow them on in cells or small pots before planting out, this is to help make sure that when the plants go into open ground they have really strong root systems and can get going quickly. We use a teaspoon to help with pricking out to avoid root disturbance and damage.

Sowing carrots and parsnips is weather dependant for us. There needs to be some warmth in the soil to get good germination, but there also needs to be moisture, so our sowing tends to be driven by the weather as much as the time of year. A warmish forecast with rain in late March/ Early April means that we'll be sowing these root crops. If you have limited space, carrots will do well in a container. A deep pot (the sort that roses come in is ideal) filled with sieved compost will work perfectly. With no stones the roots should be long and straight all you need to do is keep the compost watered regularly.

We will also be planting our seed potatoes during March. Both the early and main crop tubers are currently chitting and will be planted out in mid-and late-March respectively. We will also have planted some seed potatoes in pots in a greenhouse by the end of February for an early crop.

We'll also be doing a little bit of harvesting this month. Most of the over-wintering crops have finished by now, but purple sprouting broccoli is coming to its best now and the first crop of the new season is likely to be rhubarb (of which more later in the year).

The Royal Borough of Windsor and Maidenhead have announced energy efficiency improvement grants for eligible residents.

There are two schemes to help support low income families - homeowners or tenants.

You may be eligible if you are in a home with an Energy Performance (EPC) of D, E, F, or G and have a combined household income of less than £31,000 per annum, or certain income related means tested benefits such as Universal Credit. Applications can be made until 31 March 2026.

The first grant, ECO4, is funded by energy suppliers. Call $0800 \ 1078883$

The second, HUG2, is open to off-gas grid, where gas is not used but households rely on oil, LPG, solid fuel or electric heaters for heating, and aims to support those who find it difficult to keep their homes warm. Applications can be made until 31 March 2025.

Eligible households may be able to get insulation upgrades, lower carbon boiler upgrades and smart heating controls to improve their property's EPC. Call 0800 1070044.

The Greater South East Net Zero Hub and National Energy Foundation will access applications and arrange a survey in the homes of eligible householders to agree what work will be carried out. Installation will be completed by an approved and trusted subcontractor.

The Council's website has useful information, including a flowchart to help residents determine which scheme is best for them. Anyone who is struggling with the cost of living is encouraged to take a look at the Council's Here to Help campaign, where you can find energy saving advice, support from providers and government support.



The Big Plastic Count is back from 11-17 March, and you can take part.

In 2022 over 250,000 households, schools and businesses were involved, making it the biggest ever investigation into UK plastic waste.

The shocking truth is:

- 2 billion pieces of plastic are thrown out each year
- Only 12% of that gets recycled

Our children have plenty of opportunities to be heard – pupil questionnaire, school council, through their various leadership roles, class assemblies, PSHE lessons (physical, social, health and economic). Last term, we had a visit from the NSPCC who encourage children to 'Speak Out, Stay Safe'. The volunteers talked to our Year 2 and our Year 5 children about bullying and abuse. It is a strong message for the children that their voice matters.

Last week was the NSPCC number day. The whole of Cookham Dean Primary took part – from making hats with tricky number sentences on them for their friends to solve, to a mix up maths lesson where children went into each other's classrooms to solve maths problems. The children love it when things are done a bit differently!

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Holy Trinity Primary School

Important as the curriculum is, there's more to education than that. Our school vision states that:

Rooted in our Christian ethos, we will provide the finest education, develop enduring values and instil ambitious life aspirations.

Part of this involves finding spiritual and personal wellbeing, having respect for others and ourselves and developing an understanding of justice and global citizenship. Inspired by this vision, more and more we are seeing the children at Holy Trinity having greater appreciation of the world around them, noticing what needs attention, taking action and displaying the most incredible initiative by undertaking all sorts of projects.

Since my last entry in the Parish Magazine, two boys in Year 6 have written and published a school newspaper, 'The Trinity Times'. The January edition reported, amongst other things, on the community coming together during the recent floods, the appointment of Revd Stephen and the meaning of Epiphany. There was a puzzle page and, in recognition of the support given to them, our junior journalists included advertisements for the Little Bookshop in the village and Print 'n' Projects on Station Parade.

Aware of how news can often reflect the more depressing side of life, the boys made the conscious decision to focus only on positive stories which they managed with great success. They also chose to donate all proceeds from the sale of the newspaper to the RSPB, a charity they selected after research taught them how much wildlife has suffered during the recent flooding. They were successful in raising almost £50. Following on from the success of the January edition, plans are now in place for February's publication when a different charity, with a link to one of the stories featured, will be chosen. You are very welcome to drop into school to pick up your copy for the small price of 50p!

Another event, led entirely by three girls, two in Year 6 and one in Year 3, brought the whole school together in support of former pupil, Georgia Carmichael. Georgia, 21, a national champion kayaker and young Paralympian hopeful, suffered a brain injury at 16 shortly after returning home to Cookham after winning two golds at the 2018 World Cup in Belgium. Since then she has suffered another brain injury and more recently a spinal stroke. She is paralysed from the waist down and has spent a considerable amount of time in and out of hospital.

The girls spurred the school into action, raising money in a bake sale and by selling wrist bands with the slogan #carmichaelcan. Together we collected £370 which will go towards purchasing a power-assisted custom-made wheel chair which Georgia so desperately needs.

Despite having only come out of hospital three days before, Georgia made a surprise visit to our school on the afternoon of the cake sale to meet the children and pass on her thanks. It was incredibly moving to see so many pupils, who had only heard about Georgia's struggles in assembly, eager to meet her and let her know how inspired they were by her story.



Our work in encouraging the children to take on projects like these continues and we hope to have many more to share with you in the months to come.

Herries Preparatory School

We have been working as hard as ever at school this year to help our children to reach potentials in their academic and personal development. Our pastoral curriculum includes our PSHE scheme 'Jigsaw', playground schemes such as our 'Badger's Buddies', our Herries Values, our positive behavioural ladder, our Golden Assemblies and Form Time, for example. Children are able to talk to their trusted adults in school if they have worries, or to share these by posting a note for Winston', our worry monster to respond to. In addition, we have PSHE interventions operating in the form of our Elsa (Emotional Literacy) and Nurture Groups. To further promote personal development at Herries, we are launching the 'Zones of Regulation'. This is a toolbox that helps children to manage different feelings at different times.

A Parents' Guide to The Zones of Regulation

The 'Zones of Regulation' is an intervention which helps children (and adults!) to manage emotions, known as 'selfregulation'. When we feel regulated, we are in an ideal state of alertness for a situation. For example, when your child takes part in a sports game, they would need to have a higher state of alertness than when, for example, they are getting ready for bed, or reading quietly. There are times when it is not easy to manage strong feelings such as worry, anger, restlessness, fear or tiredness, and this prevents us from getting on with our day effectively. Children who feel these emotions often find it hard to learn nd concentrate in school.

The 'Zones of Regulation' aim to teach children coping strategies to help them to manage their feelings so they can get back to feeling calm and ready to learn. At Herries, we are launching the Zones of Regulation throughout the whole school. We want to teach all of our children good coping and regulation strategies so they can help themselves when they experience anxiety and stress. These strategies are like a toolkit. They will help children



to overcome difficulties, build resilience, persevere and solve problems Teaching children at a young age about self regulation will support them in later life. This means that they will be less likely to turn to negative coping strategies which affect their mental and physical wellbeing. We are proud of our young children and want them to grow into successful teenagers and adults.

Our children enjoyed House Meetings this week, including an EYFS and a KS1 assembly, focussed on mindfulness, breathing exercises, feelings, reading and ... bubbles! They are embracing the concept of the 'Zones of Regulation' as you can see in our photo gallery! We are looking forward to embedding these strategies further after half term.

Cookham Dean WI meeting 8th February 2024

Our meeting this month commenced with a short business meeting reporting the voting at the last meeting on the 2024 Resolutions.

Details of the ongoing refurbishment of the hall and garden were given and the current finance outlined.

Our speaker this month was Paul Johnson talking to us about scam awareness. Paul is Director of the company "Home Instead Senior Care", who provide assistance to enable senior people to remain in their own homes. They are based in Twyford and have over 90 carers. Due to their contact with older people, they see the impact of frauds and scams against the most vulnerable people. Fraud makes up over 40% of all crime today. The UK public is estimated to lose £25-£50 every second – a frightening statistic. Some older people are seen as targets for fraud for several reasons – they are financially stable; they are more trusting; and memory issues can make them vulnerable.

Anyone can be the victim of a scam, as fraudsters find ever more sophisticated ways to target people, by cold call, email, text, or WhatsApp message. Fraudsters play on emotions, often stating that you must "act now" or lose the opportunity; help a loved one in trouble; instil a fear of authority – e.g. the police, HMRC etc. Some fraudsters are doorstep callers, saying they've noticed a problem and can fix it quickly, only to "discover" other problems and demand huge sums of money to put them right.

Other examples of fraud and scams are romance fraud where the scammer asks for money for emergencies or travel; also parcel delivery scam asking for a small amount for underpayment on a parcel; bank scams; impersonating someone by email asking for help; offering you "the best opportunity ever". There are so many ways fraudsters attempt to get you to part with cash.

The best ways to protect yourself are to get good computer anti-virus software (e.g. Norton, McAfee), use strong passwords, and sign up to 2 Factor Authentication (2FA). Also, feel free to "hang up" the phone call or be rude; look carefully at emails to check the sender; pay by credit card which gives added protection; shred or destroy documents with your address on.

A most informative talk, if somewhat worrying!

The meeting concluded with the usual tea and cake.

New members are always assured of a warm and friendly welcome. We meet at 2pm on the second Thursday of every month in the WI hall. Our next meeting will be on Thursday March 14th, 2024, which will be the Annual Meeting followed by a Poppy making session for commemorative Art Installations for the 80th Anniversary of the D Day Landing.

Medical Centre News:

The eConsult service is a valuable tool for patients wanting to access medical advice. The service which is available at any time on the Surgery website, gives patients the opportunity to seek advice without having to wait to make contact with a member of staff or without having to input any log-in details or passwords. For adult or child health problem, you simply select your condition and work through a series of questions designed to a) divert anyone with symptoms requiring urgent assistance to 999 or 111, or b) for those continuing with eConsult to collect information which forms the document that enters the eConsult Smart Inbox in the Medical Centre Clinical system.

Clinical matters are triaged by a GP who matches the document to the patient, decides what is needed, the time frame and the appropriate clinician, and sends it to the Triaged part of the inbox for the receptionists to make the necessary appointments. These might be "Face to Face", "Within 5 days"," GP" or perhaps "Telephone Call", "within 10 days", "Clinical Pharmacist" etc.

The document with all the questions, answers and GP's decision is automatically saved into the patient's notes, together with relevant data such as blood pressure and weight.

Admin enquiries such as test results, fit notes, letters, insurance etc. Once the patient has selected an option there are free-text boxes to complete. The Admin eConsult documents enter a separate section of the Inbox and are handled by the Admin team at the surgery.

Vaccination programmes. The recent worrying increase in cases of childhood measles highlights the absolute importance to make sure your children receive the MMR vaccination. Measles is a most unpleasant illness which can have life changing consequences. The same advice applies to the full range of vaccination programmes available free on the NHS. For eligible older patients this includes covid, flu, shingles and pneumococcal vaccinations. To receive regular updates of news from your medical centre sign up as a Friend of Cookham Surgery. You can do this on-line or download an application form via the PPG section of the Cookham Medical Centre Website – www.cookhammedicalcentre.co.uk.

PPG Notes:

Health awareness campaigns, run by charities or the NHS, serve a useful purpose in alerting patients to key health issues and signposting where help or advice can be accessed. March is a busy campaigning month. **Ovarian Cancer Awareness month.** A month-long campaign to highlight the impact of a serious form of cancer.

1 March UN Zero Discrimination Day, to promote equality throughout all UN countries.

8 March International Women's Day – a global recognition of the cultural, political and socioeconomic achievements of women.

11-17 March Nutrition and Hydration Week, celebrating and promoting improvements in global nutrition and hydration.

13 March No Smoking Day. A sharp reminder not to smoke, or if you do, to give it up!

14 March World Kidney Day, to educate people on how to improve kidney health, a regular glass of water can make a difference.

15 March World Sleep Day. Celebrating the importance of rest and sleep in our lives. Take advice from you cat! **20 March World Oral Health Day.** At a time when it may be difficult to get an appointment with a dentist, regular oral hygiene becomes even more important. Brush your teeth at least twice a day. Rinse your mouth several times a day to cut down on bad bacteria. Teach your children the vital importance of regular brushing and help them prevent cavities.

21 March Down Syndrome Day. Advocates for the rights of those with Down Syndrome.

25-31 March. World Autism Acceptance Week. To support those with autism.

31 March. International Transgender Visibility Day. To celebrate transgender and non-binary individuals around the world.

Epilogue

Are you a pet-lover? Many people own a dog, a cat or a budgie, but most of us don't own a donkey! Yet in Bible times, donkeys were essential to daily life. They did everything from helping to grind corn, to ploughing, to carrying people, to transporting their belongings. Despite their small frame, donkeys are surprisingly tough. They can survive on poor fodder, can travel an average of 20 miles a day.

There are two occasions in the Christian calendar where donkeys walk into the picture. At Christmas, Mary travelled the 100 miles from Nazareth to Bethlehem on a donkey. And although a donkey doesn't get a specific mention in the manger story, that same one that transported her was probably there; where else would it have been?

On Palm Sunday Jesus entered Jerusalem riding on a donkey. Jesus deliberately chose this animal rather than a

horse. Why? In Bible times, the horse was associated with war, conquest and worldly might. But the donkey was a symbol of peace and humility. So, Jesus used this animal to show that He had come with the dignity of the king of peace. His entry into the Holy City also fulfilled Zechariah's prophecy concerning the Messiah.

Donkeys are hardworking and undemanding. They wait for their master to put them to the work He has chosen for them. And, remarkably, each

one bears the mark of the Cross on their backs!

Perhaps that is something we should learn—to wait for Jesus our Master, to be always obedient to Him, to serve Him with all our hearts, and to bear the mark of His grace in our lives.





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
